Subject: Projected EU ban on high-energy hairdryers, smartphones and electric kettles

An article¹ in The Telegraph reports that, having imposed restrictions on vacuum cleaners, the EU now intends to prohibit certain high-wattage hairdryers, smartphones, electric kettles and lawnmowers.

However, the Dutch Foreign Minister and future Commissioner, Frans Timmermans, takes the view that Brussels should refrain from interfering in matters regarding the wattage of domestic appliances such as vacuum cleaners.
