Question for written answer E-010800/2014 to the Commission Rule 130 Jean-Luc Mélenchon (GUE/NGL)

Subject: Does the Commission accept left-wing candidates?

When the presidential elections in Greece were brought forward to 17 December, the European Commission indicated that it had a preferred candidate – Stavros Dimas, the former European Commissioner.
