## Question for written answer E-007302/2015 to the Commission

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Subject: Cross-border child abduction

In 2006, the Commission communication entitled 'Towards an EU Strategy on the Rights of the Child' (COM(2006)0367) identified the need to develop cross-border mechanisms to combat child abduction.

Today, only 12 Member States have a child abduction alert system, of which seven are active. Yet thousands of children go missing in the EU every year<sup>1</sup>. In its response to Written Question E-005439/2011, the Commission stated it would consider presenting a legislative proposal if no further progress was made.

- 1. Has the Commission assessed the progress made since 2006 in setting up child abduction alert systems in the Member States?
- 2. Is it considering, on the basis of such an assessment, putting forward a legislative proposal for implementing a child abduction alert system in every Member State so as to improve cross-border communication and information sharing, and if not, why not?
- 3. How will it improve cross-border police cooperation, which is needed in order to effectively combat child abduction?
