Question for written answer E-009235/2015 to the Commission Rule 130 Mireille D'Ornano (NI)

Subject: Health risks associated with the current generation of oral contraceptives

On 26 May, a study of the latest generation of oral contraceptives appeared in the medical journal *The BMJ Today*. The aim of the study was to investigate the risk of venous thromboembolism (blood clot) associated with use of this form of contraception.

The findings are worrying: frequent exposure to the substances contained in combined oral contraceptives implies 'significantly higher risks' than it did to the substances contained in second- and third-generation pills. The need to identify the harmful substances is all the more important in that '18 % of women in developed countries' use oral contraception.

- 1. Given the findings of this study, can the Commission produce an assessment of the health risks associated with the use of combined oral contraceptives?
- 2. In application of the principle of precaution, can the Commission suspend application of the principle of free movement of this product in the Union?

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
