Subject: Racism in Hungary and Poland

The Council of Europe's European Commission against Racism and Intolerance published two worrying reports on the situation in Hungary and Poland on 9 June 2015.

The report on Hungary expresses concern at the increasing popularity of the far right and at its anti-Roma, anti-Semitic and anti-LGBTI hate speech. However, hate speech is not restricted to extremist parties alone; according to the report, it occurs across the political spectrum as well as in the media.

The report on Poland states that 'homophobic statements are a recurrent feature of political discourse' in the country. Attacks on Muslims on the Internet are also common.

- 1. Was the Commission already aware of this worrying situation in these two countries?
- 2. Can it say to what extent Hungary and Poland have transposed and are implementing Council Framework Decision 2008/913/JHA of 28 November 2008 on combating certain forms and expressions of racism and xenophobia by means of criminal law?
- 3. Could it promote awareness-raising campaigns in countries in which there is cause for concern?
