Subject: Work-life balance

The Commission is seeking to promote a better work-life balance in the EU, and to that end is proposing that a number of directives should be revised in order to make working time arrangements more flexible. However, the real aim of the changes set out in the 'gender equality' legislative package is to change attitudes and impose new family patterns.
