Question for written answer E-000046/2017 to the Commission Rule 130 Mireille D'Ornano (ENF)

Subject: Trans-European Transport Network and public health

According to a study published by Canadian researchers on Thursday, 5 January 2017 in the British medical journal The Lancet, living alongside major roads could increase the risk of developing Alzheimers-style dementia because of the noise and pollution caused by traffic.

The EU's TEN-T programme, however, contributes to the lengthening and densification of road and highway networks, in particular by offering grants via the Structural Funds or the European Investment Bank.

- 1. Does the Commission believe that the EU's policy of increasing the number and density of main roads is compatible with its duty to guarantee a high level of human health protection across the EU?
- 2. How exactly is the Commission planning to minimise the public health risk posed by the TEN-T programme?
