

Justification

In this context it is particularly important to refer to the opinion, as the Commission has not in this case complied with its obligation to consult the European Data Protection Supervisor pursuant to Article 28(2) of Regulation (EC) No 45/2001 of the European Parliament and of the Council of 18 December 2000 on the protection of individuals with regard to the processing of personal data by the Community institutions and bodies and on the free movement of such data.

An age limit should therefore be chosen in a responsible manner and must be based on past experience (e.g. the US visitors' programme or Eurodac).

Justification

The ICAO (International Civil Aviation Organisation) recommendation for a "one passport-one person concept" is an additional benefit to the fight against child trafficking. The existence of a personal travel document constitutes an additional protection, as well as the creation of a special field on the passport, containing the name of the person who has the parental responsibility over the child, in order to create a reliable link between the child and that person, in order to avoid abduction.

A limited term of validity for a minor's passport is required because the growth rate of children which means that a passport photo issued may be unrecognisable before the standard expiration date of a passport. Due to this limited term of validity, the standard passport issuing fee should also be reduced so that the fee reflexes the difference in the period of validity.

Justification

The present Regulation allows the taking of fingerprints of children from the moment they are born. The Opinion of the European Data Protection Supervisor advises that the provisional age limit for fingerprinting should be 14 or slightly lower, hence 12 seems reasonable in line with the report adopted on the Common Consular Instructions and biometric visas. This

decision may be reviewed within 3 years based on substantive evidence as to the technical feasibility and policy considerations relating to proportionality.

Claims that fingerprinting young children would enhance the fight against child trafficking are not supported by any international organisation specialising in this area.

Justification

The biometrics of minors are subject to change, particularly at an early age. It is therefore necessary to limit the period of validity of passports and travel documents for growing children, in order to maximise the reliability of these documents.

- 2. Biometric data shall not subsequently be transferred to authorities other than the competent authorities or to third countries."

Justification

Biometric data are very sensitive. In order to guarantee data protection, access to these data must be limited. That is why they should not be stored centrally.

Proposal for a regulation – amending act Article 1 – point 2 k (new) Regulation (EC) No 2252/2004 Article 5 a (new)

Text proposed by the Commission

Amendment

(2k) Article 5a shall be inserted:

"Article 5a
Within three years of the entry into force
of the amending Regulation, the
Commission shall submit to the European
Parliament and the Council a report on
the application of this Regulation. The
report shall include:

(i) a large scale and in-depth study carried out by an independent authority, which shall examine the reliability and technical feasibility of using the fingerprints of children under the age of 12 for identification and verification purpose; (ii) an analysis of the need for common rules regarding the way in which documents that need to be presented in order to obtain a passport or travel document (the so-called "breeder" documents) are produced and which of them are required for a passport or travel document;

(iii) a study comparing the false rejection rates occurring in each Member State and - based on the results of that study - an analysis of the need for common rules regarding the matching process. If necessary, the report shall be accompanied by proposals to adapt this Regulation."

Justification

This revision clause allows the Commission, after 3 years and taking into account the results

of the requested studies, to propose additional measures regarding:

- the adaptation of the age limit to the results obtained by the study (which has also been asked for in the Committee's report on the amendment of the Common Consular Instruction regarding biometric data);
- the way in which "breeder documents" (eg birth certificate, driving licence) should be produced in the Member States. There is a currently a great diversity in the Member States. Taking into account that normally they have less security features than the passport itself, they are more likely to be vulnerable to forgery and counterfeiting.
- the definition of a European matching process, with a common false rejection rate to be applied at the border and also a common procedure to deal with persons who have apparently been falsely rejected, allowing equal treatment of EU citizens regardless of which external border they cross.

As the EDPS stresses, while enhancement of passport security measures is important, the passport is only one link in a security chain starting with the breeder documents, to the enrolment of biometric data and lastly the matching at the border. This chain is only as secure as its weakest link.
