


NOTES FROM THE CHAIR ON THE OCCASION OF THE 100th INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY

but what happened on the other areas?

The unfortunate fact is that women are still not paid equally to their male counterparts. We have a gender pay gap of 17.8% in the EU. Globally the situation concerning women's education, health and the violence against them is worse than that of men. We are witnessing a feminisation of poverty, where single mothers and their children, elderly and migrant women are particularly vulnerable. Women are still not present in equal numbers in business or politics. Women account for approximately only 24% of members of national parliaments and governments in Europe. This year the FEMM committee decided to highlight Women in Politics in the EU as its main topic of the [IWD event](#). We are delighted of having the opportunity to consider this issue with international specialists like Mary Robinson and Nicole Fontaine and exchange views with representatives from national parliaments. While struggling for the full integration of women's rights and of a gender equality perspective in European social and economic policies, we should definitely not forget the promotion of gender equality outside the EU. In the latest liberalization movements in Egypt and Tunisia we have acknowledged the brave presence of female democ-

racy defenders raising the need of gender equality in their new constitutions. I believe we have to extend our full support for such gender-aware movements, wherever they appear, focusing on: promoting women's political participation; integrating gender dimensions of climate change; promoting the rule of law and access to justice for women and girls, in order to create societies based on justice and equality. We look forward to continue our collaboration with all women and men, gender activists and experts from all around the world working for gender justice!
