Dr. Arkady Moshes is Programme Director for EU's Eastern Neighbourhood and Russia research programme at the Finnish Institute of International Affairs in Helsinki and an associate member of the Russia and Eurasia Programme at Chatham House.



Before moving to Finland in 2002, he had been since 1988 working in the Institute of Europe in Moscow. His expertise areas include Russian-European relations, Russia's policy towards the Western CIS and Baltic States as well as internal and foreign policy of Ukraine and Belarus.
