Methodology

- Face-to-face interview in respondent's household
- National-wide, representative sample
- Two-stage stratified sample
 - Stratification by region and settlement size
 - Post-stratification by gender, age and education
- Sample size: 1022 respondents aged 15 and up
- Average length of interview: 31 minutes
- Fieldwork conducted: July 20th August 7th 2012
- The same methodology used in previous polls and in Eurobarometer



Perception of the EU General feeling about the EU


What is your general feeling about the European Union?


Perception of the EU General feeling about the EU – trends



Base: Respondents with "DK" and "no opinion" answers are excluded, N=998




Perception of the EU Perception of advantages or disadvantages for citizens - trend


Please say whether you think that statement is true or false in describing the current situation in the EU?



In general, do you trust more to Croatian institutions, like ministries, state agencies etc. or you trust more to European respective institutions?





Attitudes toward Croatia's membership in the EU Voting in (hypothetical) referendum – 2012


How would you vote in a referendum on Croatia's accession to the EU?

REASONS FOR BECOMING AGAINST:


- Because of new negative information and experience of people around me

- We are a kind of people who like strangers to lead us




Voting in referendum – likely voters only - trend

Attitudes toward Croatia's membership in the EU Current support — by young age groups



Attitudes toward Croatia's membership in the EU Current support – only likely voters – by region










Would you expect Croatia / you personally to get more advantages or disadvantages should it become a full member of the EU?












How would you evaluate impacts of reforms undertaken in justice system during last several years





Attitudes toward Croatia's membership in the EU Extent to which Croatian economy will be ready for EU accession


Extent to which Croatian economy will be ready for EU accession at the date of entry, 01.07.2013?

How much effort the Government makes to increase the country's overall readiness to meet all accession s consequences?






Please tell me for each of the following persons and institutions how much you have personally learned from them about the EU?





Information about the EU Preferred sources of information


From which of the next sources would you like to get information about Croatian accession to the EU?

From which three areas from this list you miss the most information on Croatian accession to the EU?





According to your information, how much funds assets which are available from EU funds Croatia is able to withdraw at this moment?



Conclusions

What has changed since the last survey?

- Major change in context: On January 22nd, Croatian citizens decided that they want to become part of the EU.
- General results positive feelings are still rising / declining some negative feelings. This is a trend first recorded last year after Croatia finished negotiations in June. This year general feeling about EU is highest recorded in this series of surveys.
- The virtual referendum voting behavior also reflected the change support values are among the most highest recorded.
- Some of the indicators stayed at approximately same level as in 2011., including that the EU membership would bring Croatia more advantages than disadvantages.
- But it should be noted that perception of a current situation in the EU is somewhat more pessimistic than previous years. Ongoing public debt crisis is starting to have significant impact on Croatian public opinion about EU.
- EU institutions are perceived as a staffed with experts and educated personnel, but there is rising level of citizens who think that they are inefficient and unaccountable.
- On the other hand, while many citizens still think that EU treats Croatia unfairly, there is rising percentage of citizens who relations between EU and Croatia perceive in brighter light than previous years.

Conclusions

What has changed since the last survey?

- There is still large necessity for informing Croatian citizens about EU in general, about negotiation process, and especially about consequences of accession.
- Number of people having certain misconception, is significantly lower, but informing citizens is still important. Some of the misconceptions are still deeply rooted, for example, those about destruction of about Croatian agriculture / industry by competition from other EU members, or believe that all EU members must introduce Euro as a currency and it should be kept in mind that image of euro as a solid currency is falling in Croatian public. But the biggest fear and concern are rising prices, and emigration of young people.
- Also, 2/3rd's of citizens think that Croatian economy is not ready for EU accession, and this feeling just helps to rise fears about possible unwanted economic consequences of membership.
