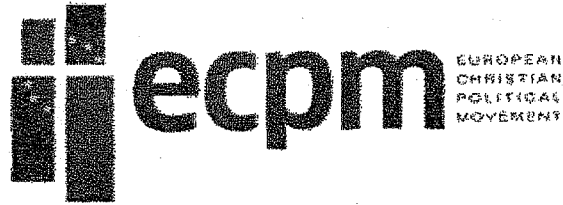




We have the responsibility to plan and carry out the required work to verify the financial statements prepared by the party and to report to the party with a reasonable assurance our audit opinions.

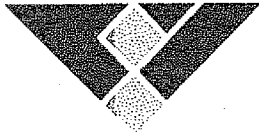
Basis of Opinions
