Freedom of movement for EU citizens

MEPs will debate the fundamental right to freedom of movement in the EU with Commission and Council representatives from 15.00 on Wednesday. The last remaining restrictions on access to the labour markets of some member countries for Romanian and Bulgarian citizens expired on 31 December 2013.

Nationals from Bulgaria and Romania were subject to temporary labour market restrictions imposed by some member countries when they joined the EU in 2007.

Public services: better value for money

Rather than just accepting the lowest bid when procuring works, goods or services or concluding concession contracts, public authorities will have more scope to pick the offer they consider most suited to their purpose, thereby ensuring better use of taxpayers' money, under new EU rules on public procurement and concessions to be voted on Wednesday.

Public procurement accounts for some 19% of EU GDP, making it a powerful lever for achieving specific societal goals. The provisional deals struck with Council in July 2013 on three directives on "classic procurement", "utilities" and "concession contracts" will enable authorities to take environmental or social benefits into account as well as the cost. For example, a contracting authority might want to ensure that high-quality food is served in a kindergarten or hospital, or undertake to buy from a firm that employs people with disabilities.

MEPs also added a new procedure to encourage bidders to offer innovative solutions by enabling authorities to call for tenders targeted at solving a specific problem while leaving both the bidder and the contracting authority room for manoeuvre to develop new solutions together.

The new laws will also cut red tape for bidders and ease access to tenders for smaller firms as well as including tougher rules on "abnormally low" bids and subcontracting, so as to ensure compliance with labour laws and collective agreements. Water will be excluded from the scope of the concessions directive owing to its special importance as a public good.

On Wednesday, MEPs will also adopt Parliament's negotiating position on the new international public procurement instrument which seeks to open up non-EU countries' procurement markets to EU bidders by seeking mutual access from the EU's trading partners.

CO2 emissions: cleaner vans by 2020

The CO2 emissions limit for new light commercial vehicles sold in the EU is to be reduced from 203 g/km today to 147 g/km by 2020, under draft legislation to be voted on Tuesday. The text, already informally agreed with EU ministers, also paves the way for achieving further reductions after 2020, and provides for the introduction of a new test protocol.

The 147g/km by 2020 target represents the maximum average emissions authorised for manufacturers registered in the EU of vans weighing up to 2.610 tonnes unladen and 3.5 tonnes laden. It will apply to manufacturers producing more than 1,000 vehicles per year.

A European strategy for plastic waste

MEPs will call for a European strategy to reduce the amount of plastic waste in the environment in a resolution to be adopted on Tuesday. They want the most dangerous plastics banned by 2020, along with certain additives and certain plastic bags.

The resolution, which follows up a Commission green paper, calls for single-use, non-reusable, non-biodegradable and non-compostable plastic bags to be phased out. It also wants a ban by 2020 on the landfill disposal of recyclable or reusable waste.

In 2010, 95.5 billion plastic bags were put on the EU market. The sector employs a million and half people in Europe but there is no accurate data on the waste it gives rise to. Global production of plastic could triple by 2050, according to the Commission.

MEPs oppose market authorisation for GM maize

MEPs are likely to ask the Commission not to allow the genetically modified maize crop Pioneer 1507 onto the EU market. This insect-resistant crop could be dangerous to harmless butterflies and moths, says a resolution to be voted on Thursday. MEPs want the Commission to wait until risk assessment methods have been improved before proposing or renewing authorisations of any GMO varieties.

The resolution says the Commission would be exceeding its powers under EU rules on the deliberate release into the environment of GMOs if it authorizes Pioneer 1507 and calls on the Council to block it.

Should GM pollen in honey be labelled?

MEPs will debate on Tuesday whether draft rules on honey should define pollen as an ingredient of honey, ensuring that if genetically modified pollen makes up more than 0.9% of the total amount of pollen it has to be labelled. They will vote on a resolution on Wednesday.

The Commission proposed to define pollen as a natural constituent of honey which does not therefore need to be labelled. However, the environment committee voted to amend the Commission draft and define pollen as an ingredient, in line with a Court of Justice ruling.

Horse meat scandal showed up weak link in the food chain

Recent cases of food fraud, including the marketing of horse meat as beef, highlight the need for the EU to review the functioning of the food chain, step up controls and update labelling rules, says a non-binding resolution to be passed on Thursday.

MEPs will call for a harmonised definition of food fraud at EU level and ask the Commission to strengthen the Food and Veterinary Office (FVO), which carries out inspections. They want a European anti-food-fraud network to be established and propose making DNA testing a standard procedure in order to prevent species fraud.

MEPs recommend that member states set penalties for food fraud equivalent to at least twice the estimated profit that is sought and impose criminal sanctions where public health in endangered.

Cracking down on criminal exploitation of wild animals and plants

MEPs will call on Monday for tougher measures against trophy hunting, the online ivory trade, trafficking in endangered species and other kinds of organised "wildlife crime". They want an EU-wide system for training prosecutors and a specialised Wildlife Crime Unit at Europol. They will also call for wildlife crime to be discussed with international partners like the African Union and the US.

Europol estimates the revenues from trafficking in endangered species within the EU alone at between €18 billion and €26 billion a year. Parliament will debate the issue on Tuesday and vote on a resolution on Tuesday.

Carbon capture and storage projects should be encouraged

Carbon capture and storage (CCS) projects have the potential to allow the EU to meet its low-carbon goals, in particular for decarbonizing high CO2-emitting industries, and should receive more support from member states and the EU, says a resolution to be voted on Tuesday.

The EU passed laws providing a framework for CCS development in 2009. For a number of reasons (including lack of finance for technological development), the EU is losing its technological lead in the area, say MEPs.

EP to approve smart tachographs in trucks and coaches

Data protection: what future for Safe Harbour deal after NSA affair?

MEPs will debate the future of the EU-US Safe Harbour agreement in the wake of the NSA spying affair with the Commission and Council on Wednesday. The agreement laid down voluntary data protection standards for US companies when transferring EU citizens' data to the US.

In the preliminary findings of its inquiry into US and EU countries' mass surveillance programmes, the civil liberties committee said the Commission should suspend the Safe Harbour standards and re-negotiate new, appropriate data protection safeguards.
