COP 21: MEPs to adopt roadmap for Paris UN climate talks

Parliament will debate a resolution setting out the mandate for its delegation to the Conference of the Parties to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (COP 21) in Paris at 17.00 and vote on it at 19.00 on Wednesday.

The text drafted by the environment committee calls for three binding targets: a 40% cut in greenhouse gas emissions by 2030, a 40% energy-efficiency target and a 30% target for renewable energy. It also wants global carbon emissions to be phased out by 2050, or shortly thereafter, so as to keep the world on a cost-effective emission trajectory compatible with the below 2 °C target.

Parliament will debate the ongoing refugee and migration crisis and might also address latest developments in Syria and Turkey on Wednesday, ahead of the 15 and 16 October meeting of heads of state or and government in Brussels. In the debate, with Commission President Jean-Claude Juncker and Council representative Nicolas Schmit (Luxembourg Presidency), MEPs will also raise questions about completing the Economic and Monetary Union (EMU) and the UK's "in/out" referendum plans.

European Parliament President Martin Schulz will address the European Council on Thursday, followed by a press conference.

Tackling the most serious refugee crisis since World War II

MEPs expect more ambition and action from EU leaders, who will discuss migration in all its aspects (internal and external) at the summit, tacking stock of the impact of recently-approved emergency measures for asylum seekers stranded in Greece and Italy. They will also discuss preparations of the 11-12 November Valletta summit, where EU and African countries are to discuss common solutions to migration challenges.

Recent developments and alliances in the civil war in Syria and the situation in Turkey are also expected to be added to the summit agenda.

Economic and Monetary Union

MEPs are likely to table their ideas for improvements to today's Eurozone governance rules, such as those set out in a resolution drafted by Pervenche Berès (S&D, FR) and will also reflect on the so-called "Five Presidents" report of which President Schulz was a co-author.

UK referendum: in or out?

Members might quiz Council and Commission on the process ahead concerning the UK plans of a referendum on whether to stay in or leave the European Union. EU Treaty Article 50 allows any EU member state to decide to withdraw from the Union.

The funds, proposed by the EU Commission and approved by Parliament's Budgets Committee on Monday, would go to the EU countries hardest hit by the refugee inflow, to non-EU countries hosting most Syrian refugees and to three EU agencies handling most refugee-related tasks.

Besides approving the immediate budgetary changes needed to accommodate the 23 September informal European Council's decisions on migrants, Budgets Committee MEPs said that the EU's 7-year framework budget system should be revised, to allow for long-term budgetary measures to deal with what could well prove to be a long-run problem.

Jewish people in Europe are increasingly afraid of being verbally harassed (46%) or physically attacked (33%), says a recent survey by the EU Agency for Fundamental Rights (FRA). One in three Muslim respondents to a 2009 survey reported that they had experienced discrimination in the previous 12 months.

A public hearing on "Anti-Semitism, Islamophobia and hate speech" was held by the Committee on Civil Liberties, Justice and Home Affairs on 29 June 2015
