Europol and its parliamentary scrutiny in the framework of EU Internal Security policies

General introduction

The EU is currently facing substantial security challenges. Terrorism, organised crime, cybersecurity and radicalisation are at the top of the political agenda. Within the Union and the Schengen area, the internal security of one Member State is almost by definition the internal security of all Member States. Therefore, there is an urgent need for all Member States to work together, to promptly share all relevant information and to improve common analysis and operational coordination.

As the EU's law enforcement agency, Europol plays a central role in supporting and strengthening cooperation between and joint action by the national police forces. On 11 May 2016, a new Europol Regulation was adopted, putting Europol on an even stronger footing. The new Regulation, applicable as of 1 May 2017, will ensure a robust data protection regime for Europol, and will provide the agency with a flexible and modern data management system, which will allow Europol to improve its support to Member States in the fight against terrorism and organised crime.

An important part of the new Europol Regulation is the fact that Europol will be under proper democratic scrutiny by the European Parliament and the national Parliaments jointly. In accordance with Article 88 TFEU, the Europol Regulation establishes a Joint Parliamentary Scrutiny Group (JPSG) to “politically monitor Europol's activities in fulfilling its mission, including as regards the impact of those activities on the fundamental rights and freedoms of natural persons”. The Conference of Speakers of the EU Parliaments agreed in May 2016 a step-by-step approach to define the modalities of this JPSG, including the organization of an interparliamentary meeting.

This interparliamentary meeting will discuss the EU internal security policies and Europol's role therein, as well as its parliamentary scrutiny and the further modalities of the JPSG.
