- Universal, affordable and functional internet access service, is a core priority against exclusion
- Functional internet access service: to be defined by a minimum list of services for inclusion, to evolve overtime
- Sectoral funded universal service mechanism, selecting a specific provider, is inappropriate for universal service policy
  - Universal service obligations net cost measurement and allocation between competitors has led to endless litigations between firms, Members States and EU institutions, and is legally unstable, financially uncertain, economically insufficient
  - Universal service obligations benefit society as a whole, justifying its financing by general budget
- Universal service mechanism implies the monopoly of universal service provider for beneficiaries: this is inappropriate for mobile services
