David PHINNEMORE, PhD, is Professor of European Politics and a Dean of Education at Queen's University Belfast as well as Visiting Professor at the College of Europe. His academic interests are focused on the EU's constitutional development, external relations and enlargement, and on Brexit. His publications include *The Treaty of Lisbon: Origins and Negotiation* (Palgrave Macmillan, 2013), *The European Union's 2007 Enlargement* (Routledge, 2012, edited with C. Chiva); *Romania and the European Union: From marginalization to membership* (Routledge, 2008, with D. Papadimitriou); *Understanding the European Constitution: An Introduction to the EU Constitutional Treaty* (Routledge, 2005, with C.H. Church).

Katy HAYWARD, PhD, is [Reader in Sociology](#) at Queen's University Belfast, and Senior Research Fellow in the Senator George J. [Mitchell Institute](#) for Global Peace, Security and Justice. She has 20 years' research experience on the impact of the EU on the Irish border and peace process, including as part of the EU FP5 [EUBorderConf](#) project and the current SSHRC ['Borders in Globalization'](#) programme. She is the author of over 100 publications, including [Bordering on Brexit](#) (2017), [Dynamics of Political Change in Ireland](#) (2017), and [Irish Nationalism and European Integration](#) (2009). She is a Board Member of the [Centre for Cross Border Studies](#) and [Conciliation Resources](#).

Lars KARLSSON, PhD, is President of KGH Border Services, an international consultancy company specialized in Customs and Borders. He is former Director of World Customs Organization and Deputy Director General of Swedish Customs with 30 years in Customs and Trade policy. He is Doctor of Education and holds a Masters of International Customs Law and Administration from University of Canberra.

John TEMPLE LANG, PhD, is an Irish lawyer, a Senior Visiting Research Fellow in Oxford, and a professor in Trinity College Dublin. From 1974 to 2000 he worked in the European Commission, first in the Legal Service and then as a Director in the Competition Directorate General. He then went back into private practice, until 2016 in Brussels, and now in Dublin. He has published one book and more than 300 articles on European law, including several articles on the European Economic Area.
