6. Annual Report 2016 on the Protection of the EU's Financial Interests - Fight against fraud

As in previous years, the Committee on Budgetary Control decided to draw up a report on the Protection of the Union's financial interests. In the framework of the preparation of the draft report, OLAF has presented its annual report on 22 June 2017. On 28 September Commissioner Oettinger presented the annual report of the Commission. In his presentation he put stress on the anti-fraud measures at EU level and by the Member States, with a focus on the PIF directive, the EPPO, the Omnibus, NAFS and CAFS.

In his report the rapporteur:

- notes with satisfaction that the total number of fraudulent and non-fraudulent irregularities reported in 2016 (19 080 cases) was 15% lower than in 2015 (22 349 cases) and their value had decreased by 8% (from EUR 3.21 billion in 2015 to EUR 2.97 billion in 2016);
- notes the slight decrease of 3.5% in the number of irregularities reported as fraudulent, which continued the downward trend seen since 2014;
- welcomes the adoption of the PIF Directive, whose scope includes VAT and welcomes the decision of 20 Member States to proceed with the establishment of a European Public Prosecutor's Office;
- welcomes the adoption of short-term measures to tackle losses on VAT mentioned in the Commission's Action plan;
- notes with concern that tobacco smuggling to the EU has intensified in recent years;
- deplores the fact that non-fraudulent irregularities in direct expenditure increased by 16% compared to the previous year, in contrast to all other budget sectors;

- deplores the fact that the Commission no longer feels the need to publish the anti-corruption report, which has impaired the assessment of the scale of corruption;
- reiterates the call on the Commission to submit as a matter of urgency a horizontal legislative proposal on the protection of whistleblowers in order to effectively prevent and combat fraud affecting the financial interests of the European Union;

7. ECA Special Report 18/2017 (2016 Discharge): Single European Sky: a changed culture but not a single sky

Air transport is an important component of the EU internal market. In 2015, 920 million passengers and 15 million tonnes of freight have been flown in the EU using almost 10 million flights. Air traffic has been traditionally managed at national level which contributed to delays and higher costs. The Single European Sky (SES) initiative was launched in 2004 to remedy this situation. The SES has been coupled with a technological modernization programme, which is conducted by the SESAR JU.

The ECA assessed whether the EU's SES initiative has so far resulted in a more efficient European Air Traffic Management. The Court found that the quantitative results fell below expectations: delays have generally been above the targets set in performance plans and have been increasing since 2013. The oversight role attributed to National Supervisory Authorities (NSAs) is hampered by the fact that they are not always fully independent and in some cases do not have the necessary resources to fulfil their role. Additionally, after modification of its role, the SESAR project now pursues an openended, continuously evolving R&D vision which becomes more and more costly for the taxpayer.

The FCA recommends that the Commission should

- review the SES high level goals;
- analyse other policy options targeting defragmentation;
- ensure full independence and capacity of NSAs;
- streamline performance scheme;
- review EU's support structure to R&D in light of its objectives; and
- reinforce accountability of the SESAR JU.

Exchange of views with Commission representative

The article 349 of the TFEU acknowledges the special characteristics of the outermost regions and affords them a special status. The nine outermost regions are the Azores, the Canary

Islands, Guadeloupe, Guyana, Madeira, Martinique, Mayotte, Réunion and Saint Martin.

Between 2014 and 2020 the European Structural and Investment Funds and a dedicated scheme on agricultural measures (the POSEI Regulation) provided almost EUR 13.3 billion to the outermost regions, including two specific allocations in the fields of regional development and fisheries to compensate for the additional costs faced by these regions because of their particular situation. Furthermore, specific rules apply to the outermost regions in areas such as State aid, with regard to operating and investments aids, as well as in taxation and customs, to help boost their competitiveness. The main objectives targeted were to develop infrastructure, provide services for the population, create jobs, invest in education and skills and increase businesses' competitiveness as well as diversifying agricultural activities, preserving the environment and addressing climate change.

Despite this significant EU funding over the years, the outermost regions continue to face serious challenges and most of them still need investment in basic infrastructure (such as roads, water and waste management facilities) and their economy depends on a limited number of economic sectors with constraints related to their remoteness bringing additional costs to their companies while impeding their full participation in the single market.

On 24 October 2017, the Commission presented its new strategy 'a stronger and renewed strategic partnership with the EU's outermost regions' in order to tackle persistent challenges, such as high unemployment rates, particularly among young people, greater vulnerability to the effects of climate change and a dependence on economic sectors which have not incorporated innovative processes. The renewed strategy will seek to shape policies that better reflect these regions' realities and interests (particularly when negotiating trade or fisheries agreements), will create a platform for dialogue

bringing together these regions and their Member States, the European institutions and private stakeholders in order to make the best use of European funds or promoting employment.

This exchange of views will focus on the outcomes achieved by the funding programs and the difficulties encountered by the outermost regions in their implementation, particularly in Guyana, and on the renewed European strategy in favour of these outermost regions.
