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Background

Pursuant to Article 20(1) of the Treaty on the Functioning of the European Union every person holding the nationality of a Member State is a Union citizen. Union citizenship is additional to national citizenship and does not replace it. The concept of Union citizenship was introduced in the Treaty on European Union, signed in Maastricht in 1992, which endowed Union citizens with a number of novel rights, including political rights.

Union citizens enjoy the right to move and reside freely in other Member States, to vote and to stand as candidates in municipal and European elections, to petition the Parliament, to apply to the European Ombudsman, and to enjoy in a third country the protection of the diplomatic and consular authorities of any other Member State. The Lisbon Treaty, signed in 2007, granted Union citizens another right – the right to start a Citizens' Initiative.

The concept of EU citizenship was substantially enhanced and developed by the Court of Justice of the EU (CJEU), which in 2001 famously claimed that 'Union citizenship is destined to be the fundamental status of nationals of the Member States'. Free movement rights – initially reserved for those engaged in economic activity and thus actively contributing to the economy of their host Member State – were gradually expanded to other categories of persons, including students, jobseekers and those who retire and settle in another Member State. EU citizenship, intrinsically linked to free movement of persons, has broadly been considered one of the Union's most significant achievements. Arguably, however, it also has the potential to become one of the most divisive, as the United Kingdom's EU membership referendum showed.

The European Parliament stated in its Resolution of 12 December 2017 that the efforts to promote EU citizenship are linked to the practical enjoyment of fundamental rights and freedoms and to the opportunity for every citizen to participate in the democratic life of the Union.

The aim of this public hearing is to listen to experts in EU citizenship and its relation with fundamental rights, including the rights of minorities to gain insight on the impact of EU citizenship in the life of the citizens but also in the Area of Freedom, Security and Justice Policies.
