Following the exchange of views with Commissioner Neven Mimica responsible for International Cooperation and Development and the Director General and Deputy Head of

Operations of the European Investment Bank (EIB) for Operations outside the EU, Mr Luca Lazzaroli on 2 October 2017, CONT had a discussion on the draft report on 19 February 2018.

The Rapporteur Ms Barbara Kappel highlighted the following set of priorities as being important to be implemented or closely monitored namely (i) the challenging issue of increasing the efficiency and effectiveness of the development policy and EDFs (ii) the need of consistency between various EU policies such as climate change, migration, (iii) the efficiency of the controls strategy and implementation of Union trust funds and budget support activities especially when domestic revenue mobilisation is at stake, (iv) the need of increased cooperation with international organisations particularly when blended finance is used and (v) the new global development priorities.

52 amendments were tabled to the draft report.

The Committee on Development (DEVE) delivered an opinion on this CONT report on 2 February 2018 for which Mr Doru-Claudian Frunzulica was appointed Rapporteur.

6. ECA SPECIAL REPORT 5/2017 (2017 DISCHARGE): RENEWABLE ENERGY FOR SUSTAINABLE RURAL DEVELOPMENT: SIGNIFICANT POTENTIAL SYNERGIES, BUT MOSTLY UNREALISED CONT/8/12369

Using more renewable energy is crucial if the EU is to reduce its greenhouse gas emissions in order to comply with the 2015 Paris Agreement on Climate Change. Increasing the use of

renewable energy could also reduce the EU's dependence on fossil fuels and imported energy, thus contributing to the security of its energy supply. Several EU and national funding programmes are available to incentivise the production and use of renewable energy, one source of the EU funds being the European Agricultural Fund for Rural Development (EAFRD).

The audit of the European Court of Auditors examined the link between renewable energy and rural development. The Court assessed whether the EU policy framework used to spend funds earmarked for rural development had been designed and implemented in a way that facilitated both renewable energy deployment and sustainable rural development.

The Court concludes that there are potential synergies between renewable energy policy and EAFRD with a view to facilitate sustainable rural development but, as yet, these synergies remain mostly unrealised.

Neither the current nor the proposed sustainability framework for bioenergy (referring to the production and use of biomass) provide an adequate basis for protecting rural areas sufficiently against identified environmental and socioeconomic risks nor for maximising their potential for further sustainable development.

The specific funding available for rural development can play a role in achieving the EU and national renewable energy targets, but this should be complementary to the sustainable development of the EU's rural areas. However, the Commission has not provided sufficient clarification or guidance in this regard nor how the EAFRD should complement the existing EU and national funding schemes. Furthermore, the Commission has no comprehensive information on the EAFRD expenditure for renewable energy in the 2007-2013 rural programming period, and how it fits into the overall EU spend on renewable energy. The Court considered most of the projects visited successful, because of their positive economic and environmental impact on rural development. However, weaknesses in the Member States' selection procedures also resulted in the funding of projects that had an economic benefit for the project owners, but had little further impact on rural areas.

On the basis of these findings, the Court makes several recommendations that will be presented during CONT meeting. The ECA Special report is available on the <u>CONT website</u>.

The 2013 reform of the Common Agricultural Policy introduced a new basic payment scheme (BPS) for farmers, which is applied in 18 Member States. The Single Payment Scheme (SPS), aims to provide a basic income support to farmers and thus contribute to viable food

production in the EU, without distorting production decisions.

The main audit question in this report was whether Commission and Member States set the BPS properly on track. The Court concludes that the scheme is operationally on track, but that its impact on simplification, targeting and the convergence of aid levels is limited.

The introduction of the BPS required substantial efforts by the national authorities but the control systems of the Member States which were visited largely mitigated the risk of incorrect calculation and allocation of entitlements.

The Commission provided Member States with extensive guidance in this process. In spite of the clarifications provided, Member States did not always interpret specific calculation rules consistently and did not provide all monitoring information to the Commission.

One of the guiding principles of the 2013 reform of the CAP was simplification. Calculation rules and options chosen by Member States did not always favour simplification, but sometimes added complexity, increased the burden on national administrations, and allowed some farmers to realise windfall profits.

The 2013 CAP reform introduced a negative list aimed at excluding beneficiaries whose primary function was not agriculture. Use of this list was only partly effective, could result in differing treatment of similar applicants and represented a significant administrative burden for paying agencies. In consideration of these difficulties, Council and Parliament agreed that – as from 2018 – Member States can decide whether they reduce the criteria by which applicants can demonstrate their 'active farmer' status, or discontinue the application of the 'negative list'.

Under the reform, as a general rule, all payment entitlements activated in 2019 in a Member State or in a region should have a uniform unit value, but only six of the 18 Member States chose this option for the whole or a major part of their territory and a seventh by 2020. As a derogation, the other Member States were allowed to take historical factors into account when calculating the value of payment entitlements which farmers should have in 2019. Member State choices have had a significant impact on the degree of redistribution of support and farmers could in some cases freeze particularly high support levels resulting from past levels of subsidy.

As a scheme essentially related to areas, BPS support tends to favour larger farms. Due to the design of the scheme, the Commission expects that with the 2013 CAP reform the capitalisation of the support in land prices will increase, which benefits owners of agricultural land.

BPS support is a significant source of income for many farmers but has inherent limitations. It does not take account of market conditions, use of agricultural land or the individual circumstances of the holding, and it is not based on an analysis of the overall income situation of farmers.

The objective of the Treaty to ensure a fair standard of living of farmers and the general CAP objective of viable food production and farmers' incomes have not been translated into measurable targets yet and there is no baseline to which the results achieved could be compared.

As regards the current BPS scheme applicable until 2020 and as regards the development of its proposals for the next programming period, the Court will present a number of recommendations during CONT meeting.

In addition to the amendments tabled to the draft reports, two opinions were delivered, one by JURI Committee to the Court of Justice and another by the LIBE Committee to the EDPS discharge draft reports.

The amendments to the Council and European Council discharge have a particular emphasis on transparency and accountability. The Court of Justice's amendment have a strong focus on issues highlighted by the ECA Special Report 14/2017 on the ECJ Performance, particularly the reform of the Court of Justice, the role of the référendaires and the judges' external activities. The Court of Auditors' amendments related mainly to staff issues, the amendments to the EESC focus also mainly on staff, the political agreement with the Parliament and the need to reduce travel expenditure. The Committee of the Regions is again facing several amendments bringing up the whistle-blower case from 2003 and other staff matters. The amendments to the Ombudsman bring up some suggestions to improve its functioning, and the EDPS' amendments are more of a general nature and highlight the creation of the European Data Protection Board for which the EDPS will provide secretariat assistance.

The original versions of the amendments were sent to Members on 6 March 2018, the English versions were delivered on 9 March 2018 and other language versions were available on the <u>CONT website</u> as of 14 March.

The study is authored by a team of experts from the Centre for European Policy Studies (CEPS), led by Mr Sergio Carrera and Mr Jorge Nunez Ferrer.

This study provides a comparative assessment of the governance and oversight frameworks of selected EU trust funds (EUTFs) and the Facility for Refugees in Turkey (FRT). It explores how these EUTFs and the FRT add to and 'mix' the instruments set up under the EU Multiannual

Financial Framework. It addresses the issue of their added value in light of the EU Better Regulation guidelines, their impact on the role of the European Parliament as a budgetary authority and the right to good administration.

The study recommends reducing the complexity of the EUTF and FRT governance frameworks, and strengthening their consistency with the EU's cooperation efforts in third countries and EU Treaty values. It advocates reinforcing the venues for democratic accountability, fundamental rights and rule-of-law impact assessments, which are trust-enhancing.
