As is becoming customary every year, the committee "lends" part of its time for formal Opening of the European Week of Regions and Cities, the OPEN DAYS, which gathers in Brussels more than five thousand participants in Brussels.

The workshop on cohesion policy implementation with high-ranking DG REGIO officials, which is reserved for MEPs, and the presentation by the author, Mr Fabrizio Barca, of his report "An agenda for a reformed Cohesion Policy", should also be noted.

The coordinators will meet at the end of the first day's meeting. Among other business on the agenda is the important issue of deciding on the future Initiative reports

2. Chairwoman's announcements

The announcements of the Chair will most probably take place on the 6th October.

3. Reduced rates of excise duty in Madeira and the Azores

In June 2008, Portugal requested the prolongation of the authorisation granted by the Council in 2002 to apply a reduction in the excise duty in the autonomous region of Madeira and the autonomous region of the Azores. Similar exceptions exist for other ultra peripheral regions of the Union.

In its explanatory notice the European Commission explains the reasons why these exceptions to the general duty rate are permissible. It also explains the very local economic impact of these measures which do not distort the single market.

The Commission proposal to renew the possibility for Portugal to apply exceptional rates of excise duty for locally produced alcohol products in Madeira and the Azores is uncontroversial.

In view of the noncontroversial nature of this proposal the EPP group has proposed that the dossier be dealt with under the provisions of Article 46 of the Rules of procedure. So far no other political group has opposed the adoption of this procedure which may be presented by the Chair.

4. Eligibility of housing interventions in favour of marginalised communities

This proposal follows the European Parliament and Council repeated requests for the EU to take measures to combat social inclusion, including the particular situation of Roma.

This proposal aims to permit the ERDF financial support for housing interventions in favour of marginalised communities living in the Member States that acceded to the European Union on or after 1 May 2004. In the new Member States, the great majority of these communities live in rural areas and in shelters (in rural as well as in urban areas) and they cannot benefit from the ERDF support, as the current legislation do not permit housing interventions outside the urban areas or the replacement of existing shelters by houses in favour of marginalised communities living in new Member States.

This proposal met a large consensus in the Working Party on Structural Measures of the Council, which made only minor changes to the initial text.

Consequently, taking into consideration the context and the urgency of the matter, since marginalised populations are indubitably the most affected by the current economic crisis, the

Rapporteur decided to take on board all the amendments proposed by the Council and not to present any new amendments or additions to the text.

5. General provisions on the European Regional Development Fund, the European Social Fund and the Cohesion Fund as regards simplification of certain requirements and as regards certain provisions relating to financial management

On 3 September the General Director of DG Regio, Mr. Dirk Ahner, appeared in front of the REGI Committee to illustrate the background and contents of the new proposals modifying the General and the ERDF regulations of the Structural funds adopted on 22 July by the European Commission.

As regards the modifications to the General Regulation, Mr. Ahner highlighted that they aim to simplifying the rules of accession to and of management of Community funds both at Programme and at project level.

Besides, a new provision under art. 77 is added aiming at temporarily increasing up to 100% the reimbursement for ESF projects in the Member States that so decide, under the condition of counterbalancing their cofinancing quota after 2010.

Since the Council has not found an agreement on art. 77 yet, no formal procedure has been opened in the Committee by now.

However, the rapporteur already appointed, M. Kirilov, ensured M. Anher on the full cooperation of the REGI Committee in completing the procedure.

He highlighted how the proposed changes on simplification go very much in the sense auspicated in several reports by the Parliament in the past of reducing the administrative burden for project carriers.

A second exchange of views without document will take place on 6 October in order for the rapporteur to inform the Members on the state of play and for the political groups to present their positions.

6. Exchange of views with Ms Cecilia Malmström, Minister for European Union Affairs acting as President-in-Office of Swedish Presidency of the Council of the European Union, and with Mr Pawel Samecki, Commissioner on Regional Policy, on the European Union Strategy for the Baltic Sea Region

The Communication on the European Union Strategy for the Baltic Sea Region adopted by the Commission (10.06.2009) has the main objective of promoting a more balanced development of the Baltic Sea region. The Strategy is unique compared to previous regional policy initiatives, as it is the first time that the EU has developed a strategy that will be implemented on a macro regional level.

The four key challenges the Strategy tries to tackle are the following:

- 1. To enable a sustainable environment;
- 2. To enhance the region's prosperity;
- 3. To increase accessibility and attractiveness;
- 4. To ensure safety and security in the region.

With the view to the Strategy scheduled for being on the agenda of the European Council (29-30 October 2009), the Committee on Regional Development will hold an exchange of views on the subject with the Commission and the Swedish Presidency on 6 October at 10:00.

It was decided at the last meeting of the committee, on coordinators proposal, that a letter might be sent to the Presidency after the debate.

7. Workshop on EU Cohesion Policy Presented by European Commission Directorate-General on Regional Policy

As it was the case at the beginning of the VI legislature, we have asked the Directorate general for Regional Policy of the European Commission, DG REGIO, to prepare a workshop on cohesion policy. This seminar will address in detail most relevant issues related to the cohesion policy issues. In particular it will look into the fundamentals of the current programming period and its evaluation, the responsibilities of MS and EC in which respect the implementation of cohesion policy and issues related to implementation, evaluation and audit of cohesion in regional programmes and projects.

This workshop is strictly reserved for Members of the Committee.

8. OPEN DAYS 2009: COTER/REGI Workshop on "The present and future benefits of Cohesion Policy - today and in future"

6 October, 14:30 - 16:15, Committee of the Regions, JDE 062

During the Open Days 2008, a REGI-COTER meeting has been organised in the European Parliament, with a wide participation of the public.

This meeting follows the same logic and is intended to provide a good opportunity for participants of the Open Days to meet and discuss with Members of the European Parliament and elected politicians from local and regional authorities.

This workshop will look at the past achievements of cohesion policy, namely, how cohesion policy has helped to overcome social and economic disparities in Europe. But more importantly, it will also discuss the indirect effects and less visible benefits of cohesion policy in terms of capacity building or internal market dynamics, thereby going beyond a mere

discussion on net returns. Furthermore, and with a view to the future, this workshop will consider recent contributions from academia, policy makers and stakeholders to the debate on the future of cohesion policy. The aim is to assess which benefits may be expected from a reformed cohesion policy and what would be its impact on European regions and the EU as a whole.

After the two key-note speeches by Ms Hübner, Chair of the REGI Committee and Mr Schneider, Chair of COTER, the floor will be given to MEPs, Members of COTER and the public for an interactive debate.

The objectives of the European year outlined in the proposal are the following:

- working towards an enabling environment for volunteering in the EU,
- empowering volunteer organisations and improving the quality of volunteering,
- rewarding and recognising volunteering activities,

• raising awareness of the value and importance of volunteering.

10. Barca Report: an agenda for a reformed Cohesion Policy

Presentation by the author, Mr Fabrizio Barca, of the independent report prepared at the request of the Commissioner for Regional Policy

In the context of the ongoing debate on the future of cohesion policy, the European Commission's DG REGIO has requested Dr. Fabrizio Barca (Director General, Ministry of Economy & Finance, Italy) to prepare an independent report assessing the effectiveness of cohesion policy to date and formulating a series of proposals on how to reform cohesion policy for the period post 2013.

To do this, Mr. Barca has organised eight hearings and seminars with academic experts and policy makers. The results of these discussions have been added to ten working papers prepared for the report and to a review of the economic literature as well as empirical evidence and served as the basis for drawing up the findings of the report.

The report provides many interesting ideas for the ongoing debate on future cohesion policy. It discusses the economic rationale and motivation of an EU place based development policy and provides an assessment of EU cohesion policy. In addition it identifies a limited number of core priorities on which to focus cohesion policy. Finally, it presents recommendations on key pillars of cohesion policy governance pinpointed for reform.

During the next REGI meeting, Mr Barca will present his report and engage in a debate with Members of the REGI Committee.

1. Exchange of views with Mr Samecki, Commissioner-Designate for Regional Policy

With a view to replace Commissioner Hübner and in line with the procedure established by the Conference of Presidents on 9 July, the Commissioner designated appeared before the REGI committee for an exchange of views with MEPs.

Members questioned Mr Samecki about the measures foreseen to react to the effects of the economic crisis, about the ongoing simplification of the regulations on structural funds and about the need to cut the red tape versus the requests for more control by the Court of Auditors, putting on the table the question of the better management of structural fund and effective use of available resources.

Members asked also about the state of the debate the future of cohesion policy, underlining different aspects: the lisbonisation of the cohesion policy, the definition of the territorial cohesion, the reaction to the climate change, the specific situation of ultra peripheral and disadvantaged regions.

Mr Samecki agreed on the need to take action to counter the effects of the crisis without forgetting however the need for a long term planning.

He expressed his view that cohesion policy should become an instrument to modernise the economies to react to strong competitive challenges without forgetting however the solidarity objective. This should lead to opening a new phase not only in the cohesion policy but also in the Lisbon Strategy.

Members formulated two strong requests to the Commission: to involve the European Parliament in the working group on the future of cohesion policy which is being organised and to take action in favour of reopening the dossier on the European Solidarity Fund which is blocked for over three years now at the Council.

2. Exchange of views with Ms Olofsson, Minister for Enterprise and Energy and Deputy Prime Minister and President in office of the Council

Ms Olofsson introduced the priorities of the Swedish Presidency for the current semester in the field of cohesion policy:

- debate on the future and on the simplification of cohesion policy as well as on territorial cohesion,
- urban development,
- the Baltic Sea Strategy.

The debate that followed was mainly concentrated on the Baltic Sea Strategy as the example for a new way of cooperating and distributing the structural funds between the regions.

Members asked also Ms Olofsson more specific questions about the state of debate on the simplification proposals and the European Solidarity Fund blockage at the Council.

EU Strategy for the Baltic Sea / EP Library, last update September 2009 In order to address the urgent environmental challenges related to the Baltic Sea and taking into consideration that the Northern Dimension framework provides the basis for the external aspects of cooperation in the Baltic Sea region, the European Council invited the European Commission (in December 2007) to present an EU

strategy for the Baltic Sea region. The aim of the Strategy will be to coordinate the efforts of various actors in the Region (Member States, regions, financing institutions, the EU, pan-Baltic organisations, non-governmental bodies etc.) for promoting a more balanced development of the Region by working together. The Role of Volunteering in Contributing to Economic and Social Cohesion / EP Library, last update September 2009

An EU Strategy for the Baltic Sea Region: Good Intentions Meet Complex Challenges / by Rikard Bengtsson, European Policy Analysis, Issue 9, September 2009

In this European Policy Analysis, Assistant Professor Rikard Bengtsson introduces the content and procedures of the strategy and identifies a number of challenges that need to be addressed. These challenges range from difficulties in improving efficiency to problems related to the intraregionalization of the EU and the lack of an external perspective, more specifically by ignoring Russia as a key determinant for the potential success of the strategy. How Does EU Cohesion Policy Work? Evaluating its Effects on Fiscal Outcome Variables / by Tobias Hagen and Philipp Mohl, ZEW Discussion Paper No. 09-051.

"The impact of the EU Cohesion Policy has mainly been evaluated by analysing its growth effects. However, this perspective neglects that the EU support might affect other policy fields as well. According to the principle of additionality the Member States have to co-finance EU-funded projects but must not crowd out spending for national public investments elsewhere. Since a major part of Cohesion Policy payments is spent on government investments, virtually all empirical studies on the investigation of the growth effects assume that the Cohesion Policy increases investments leading to a higher steady-state capital stock per capita, which, in turn, increases the GDP growth rate." Implications for the regions of emerging macro-regions

On 22 September Agence Europe published a reference to the meeting of the political bureau of the Assembly of European Regions (AER), which coincided with the Ministerial conference, of 17

and 18 September in Göteborg, devoted to the EU Baltic Sea Strategy.

The new concept of macro regions and the questions and uncertainties around it gave fuelled a fruitful debate about the role of macro regions, and the expectations of regions towards them. According to Professor Esko Antola of the Centrum Balticum (Turku, Finland) macroregions are set up of administrative regions that have sufficient issues in common to justify a common approach.

Based on the experience with the drawing up of the Baltic Sea Strategy, two new macro region areas were mentioned: North Sea and the Black Sea area. It was announced that early next year AER intends to bring together 33 regions of the Black Sea to discuss water management and tourism development issues.

European institutions' support for Swedish Presidency macro-regional strategy projects

On 19 September Agence Europe published a reference to the ministerial conference on the EU Baltic Sea Strategy in Stockholm 17-18 September 2009. The meeting clearly showed that the EU institutions along with the European Investment Bank support macro regional strategies, and in particular the Baltic Sea and Danube Region strategies.

The Swedish Prime Minister and European Council President stated that the European Baltic Sea Strategy was an innovative instruments enabling better coordination of efforts made by Member States. He stressed the importance of partnership with regional stakeholders and organisations.

The Commissioner for Regional Policy, Pawel Samecki raised three points for further discussion: whether it is possible to apply the macro regional approach throughout the EU, whether the approach should cover all policy areas and finally whether significant EU funding should be targeted at macro regional level, e.g. via the European territorial cooperation objective. The Commissioner also outlined the next steps to be taken, namely starting to implement the Baltic Sea Strategy, advancing the preparation of the Danube region Strategy and analyse the possibilities of wider application of the concept.

Diana Wallis (ALDE, UK), Vice-President of the EP took the floor and highlighted two issues: the efforts made on macro regional level should be supported by European instruments and the EP should receive regular reports on the implementation of the Baltic Sea Strategy.
