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Gendering the EU's Anti- Trafficking Policies

- Focus on the human rights and protection of victims.
- Began in the early-1990s, promoted by the WRC (EP) within the EU's violence against women policies, and culminated in the 2011/36/ EU Directive.
- Successful in discourse but, in practice? Protection remains optional and conditional, ultimately subjected to the objectives of migration and crime control.

The intersection of Gender and Security in the EU's Anti-Trafficking Policies

Human Trafficking as a political and policy concern in the EU:

The Area of Freedom,
Security and Justice
irregular immigration and
transnational organised
crime

Violence against Women
Gender equality and
women's human rights

EU Anti-Trafficking Policies

Strengthens and expands the problematization and solutions proposed from a security perspective while constraining the gender ones

Effects: 'Constraining' Gender

- 'Individualisation' and 'foreignization': focus on trafficked victims themselves (always TCNs).
- Intervention limited to the most 'extreme cases': life threatening, vulnerable victims, serious violence/harm, organised crime.
- Conditional: upon victims' collaboration and the demonstration that they entail no security risk for the EU.

Causes: The Gendered Approach

- Incorporates the security perspective: carving out a space of protection for victims: lack of agency and abuse: contradictions ignored + stark victim/criminal dichotomy.
- Disidentifying trafficked victims as 'threats': attesting their lack of agency and abuse through 'vulnerability' and 'slavery':
 exclusionary intersectionality + gendered cultural essentialism =
 - Individualization and foreignization of protection measures.
 - Limitation to extreme cases.
 - The construction of trafficked victims as a 'risk'.
