Michal ŠIMEČKA has been a Member of the European Parliament (Renew, Slovakia) since July 2019, and one of its Vice-Presidents since January 2022. His responsibilities on the EP Bureau include democracy and human rights, as well as the Members' Research Service and Library of EPRS. Serving on the Parliament's Committee on Civil Liberties, Justice and Home Affairs (LIBE), he is currently rapporteur for the Resilience of Critical Entities Directive. He was previously a senior researcher at the Institute of International Relations in Prague, served as an adviser to the Minister of Foreign Affairs of the Czech Republic, and worked as a journalist for *SME*, a Slovak newspaper, and the *Financial Times*. He holds an MPhil and DPhil in political science and international relations from Oxford University.



Sandra DE WAELE is Head of the Sanctions Division at the European External Action Service (EEAS), which is in charge of the EU's policies as regards restrictive measures (sanctions) that are applied in pursuit of specific foreign and security policy objectives of the EU. Her department is responsible for the development of EU policies and activities in the area of sanctions, including the transposition of UN sanctions regimes at EU level and the development and maintenance of the EU's various autonomous sanctions regimes. The Sanctions Division works in close cooperation with all relevant stakeholders, both internally and externally, among others relevant EEAS thematic and geographical divisions, the Commission and the Council.



Clara PORTELA teaches Political Science at the Law School of the University of Valencia, having previously served as a Professor at Singapore Management University and as a Research Fellow with the European Union Institute for Security Studies (EUISS) in Paris. Her research focuses on multilateral sanctions, arms control and EU foreign policy. She is the recipient of the THESEUS Award for Promising Research on European Integration. She has been a Visiting Professor at the OSCE Academy in Bishkek, the College of Europe, SciencesPo Grenoble, SciencesPo Lyon, SciencesPo Paris and the University of Innsbruck. She holds a PhD from the European University Institute in Florence and an MA from the Free University of Berlin.



Olga KHAKOVA is the Deputy Director for European Energy Security at the Atlantic Council's Global Energy Centre, where she manages transatlantic energy initiatives. Before joining the Atlantic Council, she was a senior programme coordinator for the US Energy Association's Energy Technology and Governance Programme. She helped start and coordinate the Western Balkans' Electricity Market Initiative working group, which provides technical expertise on creating better-connected electricity markets. She also worked as a programme director for a leading energy non-profit in the US Midwest, The Climate + Energy Project (CEP), where she co-led the conception and development of the Clean Energy Business Council in Kansas. She also worked at Bombardier Aerospace, where she developed communications strategies in Brazil, Canada, China, and the US for a distinguished human factors safety programme called Safety Standdown. She has a degree in business administration from Wichita State University and a professional science masters in environmental assessment from the University of Kansas.



Suzana ANGHEL is a policy analyst in the European Council Oversight Unit (ECOS) of the European Parliamentary Research Service (EPRS), where her research focuses on the European Council and foreign and security policy. Prior to joining EPRS, she was a project coordinator at the Geneva Centre for the Democratic Control of Armed Forces (DCAF) and a Marie Curie Fellow at the University of East Anglia, where her research focussed on parliamentary oversight of the Common Security and Defence Policy. She was awarded a PhD in Political Science from the University of Geneva.
