## **SPEAKERS**



**Reinhard BÜTIKOFER** has been a Member of the European Parliament (Greens/EFA) since 2009. He is a member of the Committee on Foreign Affairs (AFET), where he serves as foreign affairs spokesperson for his political party, and a substitute member of the Committee on International Trade (INTA). He is Chair of the Parliament's Delegation for Relations with the People's Republic of China, as well as a member of the Delegation to the United States, and a substitute member of the ASEAN Delegation. Besides his positions in his party and the Parliament, he is a member of the Europe/Transatlantic Advisory Board and the General Assembly of the Heinrich Böll Foundation, the German-Chinese Dialogue Forum, the German Council on Foreign Relations, the European Council on Foreign Relations and the IISS. He studied philosophy, history, and, for a time, Chinese at the University of Heidelberg.



Jacob Funk KIRKEGAARD is Senior Fellow at the German Marshall Fund (GMF) in Brussels, a non-resident Senior Fellow at the Peterson Institute for International Economics (PIIE) in Washington DC, where he has worked for many years. He is also senior adviser at the Rhodium Group, a private research firm specialising in the Chinese economy, climate change and international investment flows. He previously served with the Danish Ministry of Defence and the UN in Iraq, as well as working in financial services. His books include 'Transatlantic economic challenges in an era of growing multipolarity' (2012) and 'The accelerating decline in America's high-skilled workforce' (2007). He is a graduate of the Danish Army's School of Intelligence and Linguistics, the University of Aarhus (Denmark) and Columbia University (New York). He holds a PhD from Johns Hopkins (SIAS), Washington DC.



**YU Jie** is senior research fellow on China in the Asia-Pacific Programme at Chatham House, focusing on the decision-making process of Chinese foreign policy as well as China's economic diplomacy. She speaks and writes frequently at major media outlets such as the BBC and Financial Times; and regularly briefs senior policy practitioners from the G7 member governments, the UK Cabinet Office and the Silk Road Fund in Beijing, as well as major FTSE 100 corporates. She has testified at the House of Commons Foreign Affairs Committee and International Trade Committee, and was also head of China Foresight at LSE IDEAS, where she remains an associate fellow. She has been recognised as a 'Leading Woman' of the London School of Economics for her contribution in teaching and engaging the public in debates on China's foreign affairs.



Alicia GARCIA HERRERO is Chief Economist for Asia Pacific at Natixis. She also serves as Senior Fellow at the Brussels-based European think-tank Bruegel, and a non-resident Senior Fellow at the East Asian Institute (EAI) of the National University Singapore (NUS). She is also Adjunct Professor at the Hong Kong University of Science and Technology. She is a member of the Council of Advisors on Economic Affairs to the Spanish government and an advisor to the Hong Kong Monetary Authority's research arm (HKIMR) among other advisory and teaching positions. Among her previous positions, she served as Member of the Asian Research Programme at the Bank of International Settlements (BIS), and visiting Professor at the China Europe International Business School (CEIBS). She holds a PhD in Economics from George Washington University and has published extensively in refereed journals and books found on ResearchGate, Google Scholar, SSRN and REPEC.



**Ulrich JOCHHEIM** is a Policy Analyst in the External Policies Unit of the European Parliamentary Research Service (EPRS) where he works on east and south Asia and Oceania. Before joining the EU institutions, he worked as a bond analyst with a German bank in Frankfurt. He has gained extensive work experience as an economic desk officer for Germany and China in the European Commission. During his career in the EU institutions, he also spent 3 years in Tokyo and worked for the EP's Delegations for relations with the Korean peninsula and with Australia and New Zealand. Before joining EPRS, he managed studies on disinformation for the EP's Special Committee on Foreign Interference (INGE). He studied economics in Passau and Freiburg (PhD) and in between spent time in Taipeh studying Mandarin.
