## **SPEAKERS**



Heidi Hautala has been a Member of the European Parliament (Finland, Greens) since 1995. She was elected a Vice-President of the European Parliament in October 2017. She serves as Member on the Committee on International Trade and the Subcommittee on Human Rights, and as a substitute on the Committee on Legal Affairs. In 2017, she established a Working Group on Responsible Business Conduct in the European Parliament which she still chairs now. She was formerly Minister for International Development and State Ownership Steering in Finland. She has complemented her extensive political career at national and European level with other professional activities, such as journalist and restauranteur, and combined it with her various voluntary work commitments relating mostly to human rights. She has an MA in agriculture and forestry.



**Shada Islam** is a Brussels-based EU analyst and commentator who is a leading expert on EU foreign, security, trade and development policy and EU-Asia relations. After 9 years as Director for Geopolitics at Friends of Europe, she now runs her own global strategy company, New Horizons Project. Islam is a senior advisor for several think tanks, including the European Policy Centre and also Editor-in-Chief of the *EUObserver* magazine. She is visiting professor at the College of Europe (Natolin Campus) and contributes to several international publications including *EUObserver*, *The Guardian* and *East Asia Forum*. In 2017, *Politico* identified her as one of Brussels' 20 most influential women.



**Charmaine Misalucha-Willoughby** is an associate professor in the Department of International Studies at De La Salle University. She is member of the Board of Trustees of the Foundation of the National Interest, a newly established think tank in Manila. Her areas of specialisation are alliances, maritime security, security cooperation, and critical international relations theory. She has been a joint fellow at the University of Duisburg-Essen in Germany, an advanced security cooperation fellow at the Daniel K. Inouye Asia-Pacific Center for Security Studies in Honolulu, a visiting research fellow at Osaka University in Japan, and a recipient of the inaugural US-ASEAN Fulbright Program in the American University in Washington DC. She holds a PhD from the Rajaratnam School of International Studies at the Nanyang Technological University in Singapore.



Hervé Lemahieu is Director of Research at the Lowy Institute, overseeing its research agenda and output. Until 2021, he was responsible for the Institute's Power and Diplomacy Program. His research interests include Australian foreign policy, global governance and political economy, and Southeast Asia. In 2018, he developed the Asia Power Index, which is an annual data-driven assessment that maps the changing distribution of power in the region. He has also convened a number of bilateral and trilateral strategic dialogues between Australia, ASEAN, the European Union, France and the United States. Before joining Lowy, Lemahieu was research associate for political economy and security at the London-based think tank IISS. He holds an MSc in global governance and diplomacy from the University of Oxford, and an MA in international relations and modern history from the University of St Andrews.



**Ulrich Jochheim** is a policy analyst in the External Policies Unit of the European Parliamentary Research Service (EPRS) where he works on east and south Asia and Oceania. Before joining the EU institutions, he worked as a bond analyst with a German bank in Frankfurt. He gained extensive work experience as an economic desk officer for Germany and China in the European Commission. During his career in the EU institutions, he has also spent 3 years in Tokyo and worked for the European Parliament's delegations for relations with the Korean peninsula and with Australia and New Zealand. Before joining EPRS, he managed studies on disinformation for Parliament's Special Committee on Foreign Interference (INGE). He studied economics in Passau and Freiburg (PhD) and in between spent time in Taipeh studying Mandarin.
