WORLD TRADE ORGANIZATION The rapporteur for the consent file and accompanying resolution, Mr Pablo Zalba (EPP) will present his draft report in which he highlights the benefits that the trade facilitation would bring in terms of reducing delays

and costs for exporters and in particular SMEs. He also notes in his report the importance of providing assistance to developing countries to ensure that they can make the necessary adaptations to their procedures in order to be able to put the new rules into practice and the need to coordinate the different sources of funding available with a view to ensure that the money available is well spent. INTA is due to vote on the report at its July meeting.

Latvian Presidency presents its achievements to INTA (16/06/2015)



Ms Zanda KALNIŅA-LUKAŠEVICA, Parliamentary State Secretary for EU affairs, will discuss the achievements of the Latvian Presidency in the area of International Trade Policy with INTA members. During the Latvian Presidency, several legislative files were concluded by a first reading agreement between the European Parliament and the Council - three Regulations concerning the common rules for imports and the Decision granting the EU macro-financial assistance to Ukraine. Progress has been made in on-going international trade negotiations, namely on TTIP, EU-Japan FTA, Environmental Goods Agreement and TiSA. The

Council has moved towards increased transparency of international trade negotiations, by deciding to publish the TiSA negotiating mandate. The Council also advanced in its work on the 'Conflict minerals' Regulation, Regulation granting the EU autonomous trade preferences to the Western Balkans' countries and the 'Trade in torture goods' Regulation.

Following the partial vote in the May plenary and the decision to refer the file back to the committee, INTA will decide whether to enter into trilogue negotiations with the Council and will confirm the composition of the negotiating team. 
Consideration of draft report



The "Anti-torture Regulation" (EC) No 1236/2005 contributes to protection of human rights via the EU-wide export controls of items that are used for or could be misused for capital punishment and torture, combining prohibitions with licensing requirements. The ongoing legislative update will enhance the oversight by covering brokering services and technical assistance. The rapporteur wants to strenghten the regulation by including into its scope ancillary services, transit and adding a "catch-all" clause for non-listed items.

Public Hearing on Trade agreements and data flows: Safeguarding data protection standards



INTA and LIBE Committees are co-organising Joint Public Hearing on Trade agreements and data flows: Safeguarding the EU data protection standards.

Several negotiations for trade agreements (TTIP, TISA, CETA) touch upon areas that have an impact on data flows between the EU and the partner country (e.g. financial services, telecommunications). To which extent do these negotiations respect the EU's acquis on data privacy? Which offensive and defensive interests are at stake? Those issues will be tackled by renowned experts during the two panel discussions.

Annual reports 2012-2013 on subsidiarity and proportionality

Consideration of amendments and vote

INTA will consider the amendments to and vote on the draft opinion by Mr David Borrelli (EFDD) to the own-initiative report by the JURI committee on Annual reports 2012-2013 on subsidiarity and proportionality. In his draft opinion, Mr Borrelli points out several uncertainties regarding the application of the above principles in the common commercial policy notably in the field of investment protection. Moreover, the draft opinion calls for more realistic and broader ex-ante impact assessments of major EU trade agreements as well as for more involvement of the civil society and SMEs in the decision-making process regarding the EU trade policy. Within the deadline, 29 amendments were tabled to the draft opinion.

Roundtable on officially supported export credits

EU Member States have export-credit programmes in place to facilitate the financing of exports to high-risk markets. These programmes not only constitute an important instrument to enhance trade and business opportunities for European companies but have also an impact on the EU's external policies in general. As part of its control function, the INTA Committee has been following 'officially supported export credits' programmes in EU Member States very closely on the basis of the Commission's annual reports on the use of export-credit schemes in Member States. Back in 2012 Parliament adopted a resolution that noted the necessity of complying with the Union's general provisions on external action and of ensuring coherence with other policy areas, in particular the fight against climate change. There have been some modifications to the OECD 'Arrangement' over the last year. And the Commission informed Parliament that a delegated act on export credits is foreseen in the second half of 2015. In light of this, it is time to take stock of the current state of export-credit policies in the EU. The INTA roundtable discussion with high-level experts will give crucial insight into export-credit programmes from various perspectives.

Workshop: Modernisation of Dual-Use export controls



Committee on International Trade and Subcommittee on Security and Defence will co-host a Workshop on the reform of the EU's Dual Use export controls on 17 June. Members of the Parliament and academic experts will address the implications of the review options of the "Dual-Use Regulation" outlined in the Communication COM (2014)0244. A new legislative proposal on strategic export controls is scheduled for the first half of 2016.

Accession of Ecuador to the Trade Agreement concluded between the EU and its Member **States and Colombia and Peru**

Only a couple of days after the 8th EU-CELAC Summit INTA will hold an exchange of views on the envisaged resolution on the accession of Ecuador to the Trade Agreement concluded between the EU and its Member States and Colombia and Peru. Negotiations with Ecuador were concluded in July 2014. The Agreement was initialled on 12 December 2014. The European Parliament is now waiting for the official saisine for the consent procedure which is supposed to take place in the second half of 2015. The rapporteur for this resolution is Mr. Helmut Scholz (GUE), the INTA Standing Rapporteur for trade relations with Ecuador and Bolivia.

Report from the Commission to the European Council: Trade and Investment Barriers Report 2015

Exchange of views

The Commission publishes an annual report highlighting the main barriers faced by exporters in the EU's six strategic economic markets, namely China, India, Japan, Mercosur, Russia and the United States. The purpose of the report is to raise awareness of what these barriers are with a view to tackling them. Although the focus of the report is on the Commission's bilateral trade agenda, it points out the importance of making progress on the conclusion of the Doha Development Agenda and on the various plurilateral negotiations such as the one on services and on green goods. The Commission will present the 2015 report to INTA members following which there will be an exchange of views.

INTA members visit Genoa, Milan EXPO 2015



On 18-19 June, an eight-member delegation of INTA will attend the Milan World EXPO 2015, dedicated to the food security and sustainability of the global food system. With INTA competences comprising legislation and agreements covering trade facilitation, external aspects of customs, investment and commodity trade, MEPs will exchange ideas with key stakeholders, contributing to the

debate on the global food security, and will visit the EU and other pavilions showcasing innovative solutions. Ahead of the visit to Milan, INTA members will examine port operations and customs procedures at the Port of Genoa.

EU Japan Summit recommends conclusion of trade talks as soon as possible

23rd EU-Japan Summit was held in Tokyo on 29 June 2015. The leaders recommend in their statement "...an ambitious EPA/ FTA to be concluded as soon as possible". The leaders confirm they "have entrusted our negotiators with the mandate to settle the outstanding differences with a view to reaching agreement encompassing all the key issues preferably by the end of 2015."

STATE-OF-PLAY OF THE UNION'S TRADE DEFENCE INSTRUMENTS (TDI)

On-going investigations and measures in force

On 31 May 2015, there were 81 anti-dumping (which were subsequently extended in 29 cases1) and 14 countervailing measures in force. Furthermore, there were undertakings in force from 4 countries covering 5 products. At the end of May, 48 investigations were on-going.

Initiations 19 investigations were initiated, out of which 5 new investigations, 2 expiry reviews, 5 interim reviews, 1 other review and 6 anti-circumvention investigations. 8 provisional measures were imposed and 2 definitive measures were imposed. The Commission accepted undertakings offered by exporters in 1 case.

6 expiry reviews were concluded with confirmation of duty, 3 interim and 2 other reviews with confirmation/amendment of duty, and 3 circumvention investigations were concluded with extension of duty 1 new investigation and 2 reviews were terminated without the imposition of measures.

RECENT WTO DISPUTE SETTLEMENT DEVELOPMENTS

On 7 May 2015, Russia requested consultations (in a second complaint) with the European Union regarding "cost adjustment" methodologies used by the EU for the calculation of dumping margins in anti-dumping investigations and reviews. These methodologies allow in certain cases the rejection of prices of sales of "like products", the rejection of cost and price information of producers and exporters in the country of origin, including data on energy inputs as part of the manufacturing costs. Russia lodged the first complaint to the WTO on the "cost adjustment" methodologies on 4 June 2014.




