## Motion for a resolution

2. Underlines the need to review the EU's external and development policies in light of the funding gap, the increasing inequalities between and within countries and global food insecurity; recognises the impact of geopolitical changes, in particular Russia's war of aggression against Ukraine, the EU's new priorities, the enhanced importance of strategic partnerships with partner countries, aligned with the principle of Policy Coherence for Development, and the specific role of EU investments, which have to reflect both the values and interests of the EU and the interests of our partners; further stresses the need for this review to assess whether the Instrument's objectives of reducing poverty and inequalities and promoting human rights and the long-term sustainable development of partner countries are being met;

Reaffirms the commitment outlined in the Instrument to addressing the root causes of irregular migration and forced displacement; is of the opinion that, without prejudice to unforeseen circumstances, the commitment within the Instrument to dedicate an indicative $10 \%$ of the Instrument's financial envelope to actions supporting the management and governance of migration and forced displacement within the objectives of the Instrument should be respected and that this clause should not be reopened; notes, however, that $14 \%$ of the funds committed in 2021 contributed to the migration spending target; expects to receive regular substantial updates on the state of play;

around migration is detrimental for migrants' rights and local development and breaches the EU Treaties' principle of policy coherence for development;
