Motion for a resolution on the situation in Mozambique tabled by Mr CUNHA and Mr PACHECO PEREIRA on behalf of the EPP-ED Group rildehandt B5-910/00

The European Parliament,

- recalling its previous resolutions on the situation in Mozambique,
- A. Deploring the violent clashes of 9 November which caused at least 41 dead, after the demonstrations organised by the main opposition party, RENAMO, degenerated into battles with the police in a number of towns and cities in northern and central Mozambique;
- B. Whereas it is alleged that in many instances the police opened fire on the demonstrators and whereas many of the dead were members of RENAMO;
- C. Whereas a further tragedy followed these chashes when at least 80 people, of those arrested during or after the demonstrations, died in custody in Montepuez on the night of 21-22 November, allegedly of asphyxation, after 96 people had been crammed into a cell which should have held at most nine;
- D. Whereas in a separate incident the editor of the Maputo independent paper, Metical, Mr Carlos Cardoso, was shot and killed on 22 November, allegedly as a result of his tenacious investigation of corruption arising out of the country's privatisation programme;
- E. Whereas in recent years Mozambique has shown that it is capable of a sustained commitment to national reconciliation and multi-party democracy, with the support of the international community and in particular the EU and its Member States;
- 1. Strongly condemns the recent violent clashes which accompanied the demonstrations in the centre and north of Mozambique;
- 2. Calls for an independent and thorough investigation of both the incidents of 9 November and the deaths in custody of at least 80 people in Montepuez, so that those responsible be brought to justice;
- 3. Welcomes in this regard the recent setting up of a commission of inquiry by the Mozambican parliament and urges all parties to cooperate fully in this inquiry;
- 4. Also calls for a full and impartial investigation into the murder of Mr Cardoso, which does not bode well for freedom of expression in Mozambique;
- 5. Calls on all parties to strictly abide by their obligations under the Rome peace agreement of 4 October 1992 and in particular on the Government to recognize the legitimate rights of the RENAMO opposition party;
- 6. Calls on the leaders of all political parties, as well as the public authorities and civil society, to engage in constructive dialogue and not to undermine the laudable efforts

which have been made in the recent past towards national reconciliation and multiparty democracy;

7. Instructs its President to forward the present resolution to the Council, the Commission, the Secretary-General of the United Nations, the Organisation of African Unity and the authorities of Mozambique;
