Motion for a European Parliament resolution on the sentencing of Safiya Husseini Tungar-Tudu to death by stoning

The European Parliament,

- whereas the death penalty is still being applied in Nigeria, in some cases accompanied by torture.
- whereas sentences are in far too many cases not the outcome of a fair trial,
- having regard to the frequent accounts of the degrading and in some cases inhuman treatment of women in such circumstances,
- A. having regard to Parliament's long-standing commitment to the protection of human rights, especially in the context of women's rights and opposition to capital punishment;
- B. whereas the European Union has consistently committed itself to the prevention and elimination of all forms of torture or cruel, inhuman or degrading punishment, a position made clear by the General Affairs Council of 9 April 2001,
- C. having regard to the positions of the entire international community and, in particular, of other parliaments, which have been unanimous in condemning such phenomena,
- 1. Declares its absolute solidarity with Safiya and calls on the Nigerian Government to make all possible efforts to eliminate capital punishment from the range of punishments permitted in its territory,
- 2. Calls for practical action to protect women and ensure them equal status and consideration in the family and society alongside men;
- 3. Calls for the recurrence of attitudes similar to those shown in this case to be considered cause for the reconsideration of all the EU's existing policies towards Nigeria.
