Written declaration on forced labour in Chinese prisons

The European Parliament,

- having regard to Rule 116 of its Rules of Procedure,
- A. whereas forced labour goes against fundamental labour rights as laid down by the International Labour Organisation (ILO),
- B. whereas the Laogai is a vast prison labour system in China, used by the Chinese government as a tool for political suppression of pro-democracy activists, internet dissidents, labour activists, and religious and spiritual believers,
- C. whereas fifty million people have suffered as prisoners in the Laogai, where they have been beaten, tortured, and often killed, since its inception,
- D. whereas, in its resolution on prospects for trade relations between the EU and China (2005/2015(INI)), Parliament called on China to take effective and swift action against the use of forced labour and asked the Commission to offer the Chinese its support in this connection,
- 1. Calls on the European Commission and the Council to:
 - (a) condemn the Laogai, the system of forced labour prison camps in China and to stress in their dialogue with China the importance of abolishing forced labour;
 - (b) urge the Chinese Government to sign and ratify the ILO Conventions on the abolition of forced labour (Conventions 29 and 105);
 - (c) fully implement trade laws that prohibit the importation of forced labour products made in the Laogai;
- 2. Instructs its President to forward this declaration, together with the names of the signatories, to the Council and the Commission.
