## Written declaration, under Rule 136 of Parliament's Rules of Procedure, on neonatal health<sup>1</sup>

- 1. Every year in the EU there are over 2 000 000 failed pregnancies, 50 000 babies are stillborn or die in their first year and about 90 000 babies have major congenital anomalies, while 500 000 pregnancies end preterm.
- 2. Foetal, neonatal and infant mortality, as well as preterm birth and morbidity rates, vary widely among the countries. About 50 % of foetal deaths and preterm births are unexplained.
- 3. The rate of perinatal and neonatal complications has risen in many countries, increasing the risk of major adult illnesses. Neonatal morbidity is a long-term burden for individuals and society, resulting in social and health inequalities.
- 4. The available data are rarely comprehensive and fail to measure key indicators.
- 5. The Commission and Council are therefore called upon to encourage policies and specific activities addressing inequalities in the provision of quality and risk-appropriate healthcare for mothers and babies and improvement of the recruitment, education and training of specialised healthcare staff.
- 6. The Commission and the Council are also called upon to include perinatology and neonatology as a key priority area for EU-funded health research and to support the establishment of European research centres and networks and European registries with comparable data on maternal and newborn health.
- 7. This declaration, together with the names of the signatories, is forwarded to the Council and the Commission.
