Subject: Application for an old-age pension made from Greece

Regulation (EEC) No 1408/71¹ stipulates that applications for statutory pensions must be submitted to the social insurance agency of the Member State of residence. In other words, a person who has accumulated old-age pension rights in the Netherlands, but who, when reaching the age of 65, is resident in Greece, must submit his or her application for a Netherlands pension to the Greek social insurance agency, IKA. However, the application procedure via the IKA is lengthy – two-year waiting periods are common. Any entitlement to a Greek old-age pension has no bearing on the level of the pension to be awarded in the Netherlands.

- 1. Does the Commission share my view that the procedure outlined above is unnecessarily cumbersome and time-consuming and thus poses a threat to the financial security of retired persons?
- 2. In procedural terms, would it not be better if the application for an old-age pension could be submitted directly to the Netherlands social insurance agency, SVB? If so, why is this not possible? If not, what are the arguments against such a procedure?
- 3. To what extent does the Commission see this as a restriction on the free movement of workers?
