Subject: Common Fisheries Policy (CFP): implications of the European Union's current discard practice

The discarding of the non-marketable components of a trawler's catch is a significant fisheries management problem. By-catch and discard rates vary from one fishing area to another. The Commission has indicated a figure of 10-15% as a general target for reducing discards – a rate which can be regarded as safe – and intends to employ approaches specific to each fishing area in an effort to achieve the targets.

- 1. Which fishing areas in which regions already have discard rates of less than 10 or 15% and can therefore be regarded as unproblematical (please provide complete list)?
- 2. In which fishing areas is current discard practice having a scientifically proven impact on stocks?
- 3. In which fishing areas is current practice having a scientifically proven impact on the marine environment?
- 4. What form does this impact on the marine environment take?
- 5. What ways does the Commission see of compensating the fishing industry for the loss of income which will result from reducing discard rates?
- 6. How will the landing requirement serve to reduce discards of certain species (e.g. sharks, rays, crabs, mussels, etc.) which show significant survival rates when discarded?
- 7. What measures does the Commission intend to take in order to ensure that socioeconomic research accompanying the efforts to reduce discards can be carried out?

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
