Subject: Commission's call for more migrants - 2

I refer to your reply to question E-6005/2010.

1. The Commission analysis "Employment in Europe 2008" clearly provides a contrived and erroneous answer to justify Commission policies. An analysis by Migrationwatch UK, using the UK Government's Labour Force Survey, says that from 2001-8 UK employment rose by 1.34 million but the number of UK workers fell by 62 000. As well as Eastern Europeans, 618 000 immigrants from other countries secured employment, as did 315 000 people who were born overseas but had become naturalised. In 2009, the OECD stated that more than seven in ten UK jobs created under the Labour Government were taken by foreign workers, i.e. 71% of the 2 million jobs created.

Where is the Commission's logic in importing migrants when there is up to 20% unemployment in some Member States, and when migrants remove jobs from indigenous citizens?

Will the Commission also widen the scope of its references before relying on erroneous statistics?

2. With regard to the ageing of the workforce, would it not be preferable to seek to increase the birth rate of indigenous peoples in the EU?

3. What are the proposals in the new EU agenda for migrants' integration, planned for 2011?

4. Does the Commission appreciate that, because migrants grow old, each new round of immigration must be followed by another?

5. Is one purpose behind the Commission's policies to hasten the time when the indigenous European population will be reduced to minority status, and eventually dispossessed of and displaced from their ancestral homelands, which they have inhabited for millennia, by the newly-created citizens from Africa and elsewhere? Does the Commission accept that this will occur and if not, why not?

6. At what point does the Commission expect its stated policies in terms of demographic change and the displacement of the indigenous communities - and the erosion of their national cultures - to create strife and disorder on an unprecedented scale, and what action does the Commission consider it might propose to combat any such development?
