Subject:     Functioning of hotspots

Establishing hotspots in countries that are in the front line of migration – currently Greece and Italy – and providing support to them through the relocation of migrants is a just and fair act of European solidarity.

This system, however, applies only to migrants who are eligible for international protection.

1.   What will happen with the rest?
2.   What support is planned for frontline countries with regard to the thousands of migrants who are not eligible for international protection?

Return data for the EU overall stand at around 40 %. This is not very promising, despite the fact that a Commission Return Handbook has already existed for some time.

3.   What can be done to ensure that these people actually stay in the frontline countries, and what plans are there to prevent secondary moves?
