Subject: The British Clean Maritime Plan - a promising sustainable transition strategy for maritime

transport

On 11 July 2019, the UK's Maritime Minister, Nusrat Ghani, declared that, as part of a new plan to cut maritime pollution, all new vessels ordered from 2025 which will operate in UK waters will have to be equipped with zero-emission-capable technologies<sup>1</sup>.

The plan, known as the Clean Maritime Plan<sup>2</sup>, is the UK's road map for sustainable growth which is intended to pave the way for zero-emission navigation.

By following this pragmatic approach to the issue, which stands in stark contrast to the Commission's 2013 strategy to reduce greenhouse gas emissions in the same sector<sup>3</sup>, the UK will become the first G7 country to take practical short-term measures.

A sustainable transition policy for maritime transport cannot be achieved without a financial policy that includes a stimulus for shipyards and port infrastructure in Europe.

In the light of the above, how and when will the Commission actually start implementing its sustainable transition strategy for maritime transport?
