Question for written answer E-003663/2019 to the Council Rule 138 Caroline Nagtegaal (Renew)

Subject: Unruly air passengers must now really be dealt with

Last summer, I wrote a column in a Dutch newspaper about the increase in the number of unruly air passengers<sup>1</sup>, i.e. passengers who, whether or not under the influence of drugs or alcohol, do not abide by the rules in the cabin<sup>2</sup>, thus endangering not only crew members but also other passengers. I called on the Commission to act and draw up a blacklist of aggressive passengers, meaning that if a person behaves badly on a KLM flight, for instance, he or she will no longer be able to fly Easy Jet.

The Commission did not yet see a need to act. The Netherlands Human Environment and Transport Inspectorate (ILT) recently sounded the alarm, however, in view of the no less than 11% increase in reports received about misbehaving passengers<sup>3</sup>. It is therefore time to act!

- 1. How does the Council view the increase in the number of reports to the ILT about aggressive passengers?
- 2. What action does the Council propose to take to deal with aggressive passengers?
- 3. Is the Council prepared to produce a general blacklist of aggressive passengers, given that the Commission still sees no scope for doing so?
