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Subject: Involving SMEs in implementation of the Commission's connectivity initiative

The Commission's space-based connectivity initiative aims to install a third satellite infrastructure alongside Galileo and Copernicus which will operate as a secure, comprehensive communication system.

On 16 September 2020 the Commission published a call for tenders for a feasibility study to include the design, development and launch of the communication system (DEFIS/2020/OP/0008). It is regrettable that micro, small and medium-sized enterprises (MSMEs) are not involved in carrying out the study. Calls for tenders must ensure that MSMEs are not indirectly put at a disadvantage by individual criteria. Criterion T1 of the call for tenders in question contains the condition that applicants must have undertaken at least five projects or programmes each with a contract value of at least EUR 100 million. The criterion cannot be applied proportionally according to the size of the enterprise.

- 1. Were applications for this tender received from MSMEs which satisfied the criteria, and did the Commission consider how MSMEs could be involved in carrying out the study?
- 2. How will the Commission involve MSMEs in future stages of this connectivity initiative, and how does it ensure that MSMEs are not put at a disadvantage by tender criteria?
- 3. Does the Commission agree that Europe must thoroughly reform its space market in order to be more in line with global developments and thus be more competitive?
