## Question for written answer E-003711/2021 to the Commission Rule 138 Dominique Bilde (ID)

Subject: International people trafficking and Bangladeshi migrants

The US Department of State's 2021 report on people trafficking draws attention to the plight of the Bangladeshi migrants who are victims of the 'kafala' system in place in a number of Islamic countries (especially for domestic work)<sup>1</sup>.

The report notes that '21,230 Bangladeshi workers returned from Saudi Arabia during the reporting period, many likely domestic workers'. However, 'the government did not report screening any of the returning workers for signs of trafficking'. Some of the returnees to Bangladesh were penalised for sullying 'the image of the nation'<sup>2</sup>.

On 23 May 2015, Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina branded migrants leaving the country (some of whom were stranded at sea) 'mentally sick', said they risked bringing the country into disrepute and warned that those who left 'illegally' could be punished.

Bangladesh received EUR 655 000 000 in European development aid for the 2014-2020 period<sup>4</sup> and enjoys preferential trade arrangements with the EU under its 'Everything but Arms' scheme<sup>5</sup>. Does the Commission intend to reconsider these benefits in view of these practices, which do not help fight people trafficking and are likely to deter some migrants from returning?
