## Question for written answer E-000208/2022 to the Commission Rule 138

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Subject: Availability and reliability of rapid antigen tests

Though less reliable than PCR tests, rapid antigen tests for COVID-19 have become an important tool in our fight against the pandemic. They enable citizens to be tested quickly and can identify positive cases before people have had time to get a PCR test result. Antigen tests must be widely available in order to have the biggest impact. As we face ever-rising case numbers this spring, several EU countries<sup>1</sup> are reporting shortages, and rising prices<sup>2</sup>, of COVID-19 antigen tests.

- 1. Is the Commission satisfied that there is an adequate supply of COVID-19 antigen tests in the EU? Is it planning to launch another joint procurement initiative for antigen tests in the near future to ensure their availability throughout the EU?
- 2. Is the Commission satisfied, based on data provided by the European Centre for Disease Prevention and Control, that all available antigen tests on the market meet acceptable quality standards?
- 3. Given reports in the UK<sup>3</sup> of faulty results due to antigen tests not being sensitive enough to detect low viral loads of the Omicron variant of COVID-19 (the dominant strain<sup>4</sup> in the EU), how do the Commission and Member States plan to improve the availability and acceptability of antigen tests?
