Subject: Immediate need for a common European migration policy

We can see that migration has assumed alarming dimensions across Europe, especially in frontline countries. Countries such as Cyprus, for example, in which the migrant intake is highest compared to its population, have already been stretched to breaking point.

The lack of a common European policy in response to this major issue is creating many problems. What is needed is a joint approach and concrete policies.

The current situation is precisely the result of failure to achieve this. Now more than ever, there is a need for new policies and common framework provisions for migration and asylum. This is the only way to end the deadlock both in Cyprus and in the other frontline countries.

In view of this:

Can the Commission say what action it plans to take in order to secure agreement on a fundamentally acceptable approach?

Does it intend to take action to ensure a fair distribution of migrants and asylum seekers?

Finally, what efforts are being made to bring on board those Member States that are currently refusing to take any responsibility for helping to resolve matters?
