NutriScore system not suited to consumer use and harmful for producers - Commission Subject:

position and EFSA's role

According to recent reports in the media, the Italian competition authority has announced that the NutriScore system cannot be used in Italy unless accompanied by a warning notice for consumers, as otherwise they could be misled when selecting food since it 'does not give consumers any incentive to make a proper appraisal so that they follow a sensible eating plan that meets their daily nutritional requirements'. In so doing, it is agreeing that Italian farmers are right; like their Spanish counterparts they are complaining that NutriScore is unjustifiably detrimental to star products in the healthy Mediterranean diet, such as olive oil and a large number of Spanish products.

The EU has a great opportunity here for the prestigious European Food Safety Authority (EFSA) to establish its own homogeneous nutritional information system in all Member States.

In the light of this:

- Is the Commission suggesting that EFSA should design a system to inform consumers about the nutritional values of food?
- 2. What progress has been made recently on the harmonisation of front-of-pack nutrition labelling as announced by the Commission?
- 3. Are decisions such as the one taken in Italy and the demands of farmers and the healthy Mediterranean diet being taken into account in the decision about a common labelling system?
