Subject: Commission in Brussels is paying foreigners for protection

After entrusting its cloud services to Amazon, the Commission has awarded a contract worth EUR 1.2 billion over eight years to British Telecom to manage 'TESTA', its service for communicating confidential information between EU Member State administrations¹.

In addition to IT security, physical security is also outsourced to non-European, international firms. The US security company G4S 'provides security' for the Commission's headquarters in Brussels². According to a previous reply from the Commission, a budget of approximately EUR 50 million per year is earmarked for the security of its sites in Brussels and Luxembourg³.

It is worth noting that G4S's Belgian subsidiary agreed in 2021 to pay USD 15 million to settle a US lawsuit over fraudulent tendering of contracts for the protection of US bases in Belgium⁴.

- 1. Did the Commission receive any offers from genuinely European companies in its calls for tender for contracts to provide security for its offices in Europe or its delegations?
- 2. What percentage of the security budget is allocated to genuinely European companies by the Commission and its external action service, the EEAS?
- 3. What criteria define a European company?
