Question for written answer E-003731/2022 to the Commission Rule 138 Tom Vandenkendelaere (PPE)

Subject: Impact on the European poultry sector of trade deregulation with Ukraine

On 4 June 2022, Regulation 2022/870 introducing temporary trade deregulation measures for Ukrainian products entered into force. From the outset, feedback regarding the impact on European producers began to come in from a number of sources, including as the poultry sector. On average, around 18 500 tonnes of poultry have been imported from Ukraine each month since the measures came into force. Between 1 January 2022 and 2 November 2022, total imports of poultry from Ukraine amounted to 131 000 tonnes, 85% up on the same period last year, the increase for frozen meat being particularly dramatic (162%). In addition, total EU egg imports of eggs were up 273% on the same period last year. In other words, the tariff-free quota has tripled from 70 000 tonnes to 220 000 tonnes per annum. In view of this:

- 1. Does the Commission intend to respond if this trend continues and thus threatens to undermine our own European poultry farmers? If so, how?
- 2. What accompanying policy options is it considering to mitigate the damage to poultry farmers caused by these trade deregulation measures?
