Question for written answer E-000343/2023 to the Commission Rule 138

Subject: eBook markets

It has come to my attention¹ that the actions of international publishers and eBook platforms are making it impossible for university and public libraries in Ireland (and elsewhere in Europe²,³) to provide a sustainable digital service to students, researchers, teachers and members of the public.

The issues stemming from poorly functioning eBook markets include: (i) prices being up to 10 times the cost of an equivalent paper book; (ii) a refusal to license to libraries; (iii) a requirement to buy bundles of eBooks, as publishers refuse to sell individual titles; (iv) the sudden removal of purchased titles⁴; and (v) libraries spending huge amounts on collections that disappear within a short space of time as they do not own titles, but are forced to rent them where they can.

In the light of this, with a particular focus on publishers and digital platforms:

- Is the Commission looking at the competition issues that arise from poorly functioning eBook markets?
- 2. What information would the Commission require in order to start monitoring eBook markets and launch an enquiry?
