Subject: Administration of cross-border healthcare schemes in Ireland

The Irish Ombudsman recently published a review¹of the administration of the Cross-Border Healthcare Scheme established in Ireland under Directive 2011/24/EU, and the Treatment Abroad Scheme established under Council Regulation (EEC) No 1408/71 and operated under Council Regulation (EEC) No 574/72. This review identified numerous barriers to access for Irish patients to both schemes, as well as problems with their administration by the Irish Health Service Executive.

- 1. Can the Commission comment on the Irish Ombudsman's findings?
- 2. Is it satisfied that the administration of both schemes in Ireland meets the requirements of the relevant legislation, or is it concerned that Irish people's access to cross-border healthcare has been impeded by the administration of the relevant schemes, causing those requiring healthcare to suffer distress, physical pain and/or handicap, and hardship?
