## Question for written answer E-001600/2023 to the Commission Rule 138 Aurélia Beigneux (ID)

Subject: The flood of synthetic cannabis into Europe

Created in the 1940s, hexahydrocannabinol, or HHC, is a synthetic drug derived from cannabis that is currently flooding our continent because of the easy access to it. Sold legally and benefiting from a legal limbo, this product is causing a great deal of concern among doctors.

Its flower or resin can be smoked or it can be eaten – with similar mind-altering effects to cannabis – and it is sold in tobacconists or specialist shops. Far from harmless, HHC is not without risks to consumers' health: it has many adverse effects on the neurological, cardiovascular and digestive systems and can lead to anxiety and depression.

In view of this:

- 1. Is the Commission preparing an evaluation plan for HHC?
- 2. Does it plan to ban this highly harmful substance from EU markets and does it intend to run a prevention campaign for the Member States, in particular via the European Monitoring Centre for Drugs and Drug Addiction?
- 3. More generally, how does it intend to combat the emergence and marketing of new synthetic drugs?

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
