Subject: Fundamental Rights Report 2023

In a statement published on Wednesday 5 July 2023, the European Union Agency for Fundamental Rights (FRA) revealed that in 2017, 'the police searched or asked 34 % of ethnic minorities for their identity papers compared to 14 % of people generally. In some countries, over 80 % of ethnic minorities perceived the most recent police stop as ethnic profiling.'

Since a juvenile delinquent who habitually refused to comply with the authorities died on Tuesday 27 June, France has been experiencing a nightmarish period of unrest, which is only just slowly beginning to ease. However, Michael O'Flaherty, Director of the FRA, stated that '[n]o one should be afraid of a police stop. The EU and its Member States need to step up their efforts to tackle racism and build trust in our societies.'

- 1. In the Commission's view, what are the reasons behind the police searching or asking 34 % of ethnic minorities for their identity papers compared to 14 % of people generally?
- 2. Does it deny that there is a link between immigration, mainly from outside Europe, and the riots that took place in France at the end of June and beginning of July?
- 3. Does it support the comments made by Commissioner for Justice Didier Reynders criticising the French police?
