Question for written answer E-000109/2024 to the Commission Rule 138

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Subject: Supporting tests on independent, open-air poultry farms

The successive waves of bird flu have not only resulted in the regular slaughtering of all poultry on affected farms, but also in all previously free-range poultry having to be kept in claustration.

This is bad both for animal welfare and consumers, as meat is labelled 'free-range' despite the poultry having been reared indoors.

France, however, is going to test biosecurity measures against bird and swine flu specifically designed for independent open-air farms across dozens of holdings. The aim is to eventually get open-air farms back up and running, for the good of animals and consumers.

- 1. Does the Commission know whether similar tests are being carried out in other EU Member States?
- 2. Would it be ready to fund further tests to this end?
- 3. As poultry vaccination has not proven to be effective, would it not be better to favour independent open-air farms, without systematic slaughtering, to allow for the selection of poultry that are more resistant to bird flu?

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
