Subject: Alarming decline in bird populations in Europe

While the European Union has been adopting one regulation or directive after another in the field of biodiversity, many bird species are in critical danger of extinction due to the Commission's globalist and ultra-liberal ideology.

The numerous free trade agreements have considerably intensified maritime traffic, leading to an increase in spills of chemicals, hydrocarbons and other polluting substances and, consequently, disrupting the wintering of birds.
